





Take care with food in the heat during summer

eople are being urged to take extra care when **L** preparing food during warmer weather. Victoria's Chief Health Officer, Dr Brett Sutton, warned failure to cook poultry correctly or mishandling could lead to illness. He said correct handling and temperature control was the key to minimising food poisoning from bacteria such as Salmonella and Campylobacter. Other important tips for a food safety:

- Thoroughly wash and dry hands when preparing food and before eating.
- Avoid spoiled foods, foods past their use-by dates or foods in damaged containers

- Keep chilled foods cold at five degrees Celsius or colder and hot food hot at 60 degrees Celsius or hotter avoid room temperature.






